5 YEAR'S SERVICE AWARD

Ms Busi Milazi received her 5 Years of Service Award with MASDT at the annual Year-End function, this year held at "The Stoep" in Nelspruit. Busi started her career at MASDT in 2011 as a cleaner, but her quirky character and outgoing personality made her popular and she was promoted to receptionist the following year. She certainly proved her worth and in 2016 she was yet again promoted to Business Support Administrator.





When you classify yourself as an entrepreneur, you know it means more than just starting a business. Every business will be tested and unforeseen circumstances will happen, but how the business owner deals with these, sets the entrepreneur apart from the fly-by-night business owners. A person(s) who can turn a roadblock into an opportunity is the one most likely to succeed because, let's face it, life and business isn't easy.

This is just what two entrepreneurs from Thohoyandou in the Limpopo Province did. British American Tobacco (BAT) have a Socio-Economic Development Programme with which they support local farmers farming tobacco for them, by supplying them with vegetable seed, fertilizer and other inputs to supplement their tobacco farming for when the tobacco season is over.

Lufuno Ramabulana and Oscar Tshikala are two of the farmers who benefitted from the BAT/ SED Programme through their venture called Dembe Agricultural Enterprise and are farming with cabbage and other vegetables. Due to the ongoing drought and subsequent above average temperatures of the summer, they realised that the sun has scorched their cabbage heads, and while still being edible, it was unappealing to the local market and they were in for a financial loss as well as production losses.

Ramabulana and Tshikala realised that they have to find a way to overcome this obstacle and make it work for them. They started doing some market research and found three things: that one can make atchar from cabbage and that it is actually in demand by the local community as it provides a unique flavour. It is also cheaper than the normal mango atchar. They came up with a plan to add value to their business by taking the unwanted cabbage and turning it into the sought after atchar. They approached Lufuno's sister, who is a culinary enthusiast, and she gladly accepted the challenge of making cabbage atchar.

The process took three weeks before the atchar was ready and taste tests were done. The project is still in its trail stage, but the response from the trails and taste tests done are positively overwhelming and these two entrepreneurs are certain it will be a success as word has already gotten around about this new and exciting product and people are queuing to order.

They are currently selling the atchar in a 500g container at R20 which gives the farmer a good return on his investment.

But the buck doesn't stop here for the two partners and their prospect of success in alternative products have given them the desire to add yet more value to their company. Ramabulana and Tshikala are looking into dried cabbage and are in the stages of doing proper market research and looking for resources and decent packaging for this new product. Lufuno says that he would like to see the products branded and labelled professionally, in order to make them a household name in the cabbage industry.

MASDT contractual agriculturist, Dawie Geldenhuys, has been mentoring the project and has full confidence in Lufuno and Oscar's venture. Isn't it amazing what can be achieved if you look beyond what is the norm? These two firebrands are certain testimony that you really can do anything if you put your heart and mind into it!

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THE 6TH SEDA INFORMATION DAY



Every year South Africa's leading National Development Agency - Seda - hosts its annual National Incubation Day where selected exhibitors and Seda board members can come together to network while discussing important topical points of interest.

The event was held on the Mankwe Campus of the Orbit TVET College in Rustenburg on the 8th December 2016 under the theme "Commercialising Disruptive Technologies in Incubation".
