MENTORSHIPS IN HECTORSPRUIT

It has been proven in the past that by taking hands and supporting each other rather than working against each other is what will grow South Africa's economy. This is nowhere more true than the agricultural sector. Farmers, government and other affiliated institutions often lean on one another for support and not only does this create an inclusive economic environment, but also a basis for trust in each other.

The new Seda branch in Malelane recently approached MASDT to act as business advisors and to conduct mentorship programmes and coaching for various Seda funded projects in the Hectorspruit area of Mpumalanga. The agreement includes a range of technical and practical workshops to uplift the struggling local entrepreneurs.

The mentorship programme started in the second week of March and the first project at hand was Magolide Poultry Farming. Magolide is owned by the Bodila family who started farming in 2015 after they purchased a 14 hectare smallholding in Hectorspruit. Initially the family wanted to farm tropical fruit like mangos and litchis, but after careful deliberation with MASDT consultants, they decided that broiler production would not only be a market savvy choice, but also more cost effective.



Before embarking on mentorship programmes, MASDT first assesses the need, skills levels and available opportunities of the specific project. Focus areas are addressed assessment is then followed by an interview of the farmers and an evaluation of their production processes. A physical assessment of the farm is performed which will influence the emphasis of workshops and the production monitoring process.

The mentors used the Growth WheelTM 3600 Screening tool and the 30-60-90 Day Action plan for a more systematic approach to MASDT's business advisory services. These tools assist in checking how well the project does in each focus area, identifying and focussing on the most detrimental challenges in the business, making decisions and taking the relevant action.

Such an approach provides a 3600 perspective on all the components of a business, thus assisting the farmer to focus on each component individually and according to relative prioritisation. It helps the farmer as well as the mentor to enhance the decision making process on the farm.

The mentors used technical workshops where both employees and owners were exposed to a classroom situation while each topic was extensively covered. The owners also underwent Business Management courses in order to make more informed decision about the farms financial goals. Employees were treated to further practical workshops in the broiler houses.

An external stakeholder was invited to present topics on SARS compliance, Income tax requirements and the benefits of VAT registration. MASDT's Procurement Department has already started following up on market linkages for reputable suppliers in the area.

Mr and Mrs Bodila are still new to broiler farming and most challenges faced are common ones that MASDT Business Development Officers come across each day. Yet it is problems that can easily be overcome with the right training and coaching and therefore it was decided that Magolide Poultry Farm would be included into MASDT's three year mentorship programme to insure that they receive continued support in their new venture.

Collen assisted Vurhonga in drafting and submitting the invoice, totalling to R 31 465.00.

Vurhonga has proved that when you work hard and keep your faith, success will become your destiny.

So far the feedback has been overwhelmingly positive and a good indication of where certain criteria can be approved upon. The surveys will be conducted over the next two months

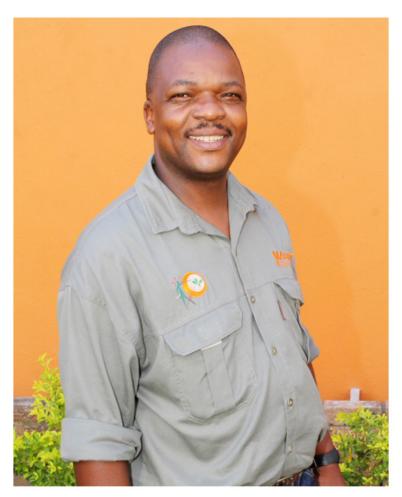
