


The Presidential Race





Estimated electoral college votes


Our model is updated every day and combines state and national polls with economic indicators to predict a range of outcomes. The midpoint is the estimate of the electoral-college vote for each party on election day.




US Election Outcome

- Covid-19 game changer.
- Highest ever voter turnout.
- 100m early and postal votes
- 150m votes (+62% turnout).
- Biden ± 78m votes and Trump ± 73m votes.
- Composition of House and Senate as important.
- A post-Trump world!



US Election Outcome


- Demography determines popular vote.
- Women (53%) of the voting public already showed anti-Trump sentiment in 2018 Midterm.
- Civil unrest within a pandemic (BLM).
- Referendum on Trump
- Democrats lost seats in House of Representatives.
- Latinos (18%) voted Trump
- Blacks (13%) voted Biden.



US Election Outcome


- Electoral College determine who will be president.
- 270 Electoral votes required.
- 50 State elections takes place.
- Each state certifies own election in mid-December and choose electors.
- Once electors voted, you may call yourself "President-Elect" (Technical).
- Electors may vote their own mind/ conscious, but has never happened.
- Demography determines popular vote.

The 2020 Election in the USA

What if Joe Biden wins?





- The Biden Administration will inherit a very difficult situation.
- Democrats will have to manage expectations in terms of immigration and healthcare.
- Economic uncertainty in the post-Covid era would be a major challenge.
- The role of Senate will be critical. A Republican Senate will be a difficult political animal.
- Trump will still play a role, despite losing.
- The Supreme Court will be a conservative court and that will not change quickly.
- Europe and NATO will relax their relationship with the US.
- China, Russia, Iran and North Korea will experience a different US foreign policy.
- The Middle East, especially Turkey and Israel may experience difficulty.
- Trade relations will be renegotiated.
- US will re-join global climate initiatives.
- The relationship with the UN and the WHO will be restored.
- More relaxed relationship with SA Government (AGOA).





The Virtuous and Vicious Cycles

The focus of the Ramaphosa Presidency



Virtuous Cycle Centripetal forces dominate ("Seeking the centre") Vicious Cycle Centrifugal forces dominate ("Moving away from the centre") The Ramaphosa presidency (blue) is build on the following:


- To get the economy going through several policies and projects.
- To end corruption and to strengthen the legal system.
- To reactivate the NDP as a national project.
- To undo the legacy of the Zuma years of state capture.
- To develop a capable state.

Opposition to Ramaphosa not really from opposition parties, but primarily from within the ANC (red):

- Undermine his policies.
- Continue corrupt activities.
- Factionalism in the ANC.
- Exploit Covid 19 crisis.



GDP Growth and the Political Climate*




The % change in GDP (blue graph) shows the following:

- Economy grows on average at 3,5% until 2010 and then the decline starts
- RSA got through the 2008-2009
 Global Banking crisis well.
- The Nene crisis in 2015 was a severe shock on the system
- The nine lost years of Jacob Zuma 2009 to 2018 clearly visible.
- Ramaphosa having a hard time energizing the economy since 2018.

Political climate (red graph) shows:

- Positive when the economy grows.
- Negative when the economy in decline.
- The Zuma years dominate by state capture constitute longest period of negative political climate since 1987.

It's by-election Super Wednesday in South Africa



- Largest election on single day. Continue on 18 Nov.
- 107 Councillors in 95 wards
- ANC retained 64 wards; lost 2 wards and won 6 new wards.
- DA retained 14 wards; lost 9 wards and won 2 new wards.
- IFP retained 4 wards and won 1 new ward.
- Patriotic Alliance won one new ward.
- Good Party won one new ward.
- · Al Jama-Ah won one new ward.
- · Vryheidsfront Plus won one new ward.
- National Freedom Party lost one ward.
- United Front of Civics Party lost one ward.

Conclusion

- 1. Covid-19 created enormous socio-economic challenges for an already weak South African economy.
- 2. Crisis always create new opportunities and stimulate innovation.
